PROJECT: 899 Charleston dba Moldaw Residences

PURPOSE: Authorize the Issuance of Bonds to Refinance the Acquisition, Construction, Improvement,

Renovation and Equipping of Continuing Care Facilities located in the County of Santa Clara.

AMOUNT: Not to Exceed \$64,000,000

PROJECT SUMMARY:

The Series 2024 Bonds will be used to refinance the Series 2014A Revenue Refunding Bonds, generating cash flow and NPV Savings for Moldaw. The estimated NPV savings is 7.624%.

PROJECT ANALYSIS:

About Moldaw:

899 Charleson dba Moldaw Residences ("Moldaw"), is a 501(c)(3) corporation that owns and operates a multi-level continuing care retirement community ("CCRC") in Palo Alto, California, located on the Taube Koret Campus for Jewish Life, immediately adjected to the Oshman Family Jewish Community Center and Schultz Cultural Arts Hall. Moldaw began operations in 2009 and includes 170 independent living ("IL") apartments and 23 assisted living/memory care ("AL/MC") apartments. Although Moldaw does not offer skilled nursing care on its campus, it offers a continuum of senior care options through its licensed assisted living, memory care programs, hospice care, and relationships with skilled nursing facilities in the area, which enable most residents to remain at Moldaw through the end of their life.

Public Agency Approval:

TEFRA Hearing: A TEFRA hearing is not required since the weighted average maturity (WAM) of the bonds

is not being extended. However, Section 9 of the CSCDA joint powers agreement requires approval by the local agency wherein bonds will be issued. The County of Santa Clara

approved the Section 9 resolution on October 8, 2024.

Public Benefit:

Moldaw is a valuable asset for Palo Alto and addresses community needs and offers community benefits in a number of different ways: intergenerational programming, intentional workforce diversity (gender, age, ethnicity, language, religious), and community participation in select on-campus programming. Located on the Taube Koret Campus for Jewish Life, Moldaw is a unique intergenerational retirement community that welcomes people of all faiths, cultures and backgrounds:

- Taube Koret Campus for Jewish Life the 8.5-acre site is anchored by the Oshman Family Jewish Community Center and Moldaw Residences. Since opening in September 2009, the campus has created an exciting hub for the region's growing Jewish community and contributed to the revitalization of the South Palo Alto area.
- Oshman Family Jewish Community Center state-of-the-art, 30,000-square-foot center features a gymnasium, a swimming pool and indoor water park, pools, fitness training, yoga classes and a lounge.
- Schultz Cultural Arts Hall 370-seat performing arts center, with year-round performances and lectures by established and upcoming writers, musicians, dancers, artists, actors and educators.

DEI Related Policies & Activities

- Creates a diverse and inclusive work environment:
 - Bans "culture fit" as a reason for rejecting a candidate. When interviewers want to reject candidates for "culture fit" or a "gut feeling," unconscious bias is often at play.
 - Stresses importance of diversity and inclusion during employee onboarding and during all staff meetings to ensure each employee knows to create a welcoming organizational culture.
 - Celebrates holidays and events for underrepresented groups like Black History Month, Juneteenth, and Pride.
 - Schedules team bonding activities during the day rather than after 5:00 so that working parents and caregivers--and folks with different lifestyles in general-- are able to participate.
- Fosters intergenerational connections:
 - Middle-school aged youth meet with Moldaw's seniors twice per month as part of a partnership with a local school
 - JCC preschool students participate in various events with Moldaw's seniors, with a focus on Jewish holidays and traditions
 - Provides resources to and positive impact on the larger community:
 - Grief and bereavement support groups are open to the public
 - Stanford Health Care runs evidence-based exercise programs twice per week that are open to nonresidents
 - The sustainability committee helps reduce waste generated by the more than 300 individuals who are residents or employees
 - Moldaw participates in the Alzheimer's walk

Authority Community Facilities District No. 2022-08 (Fancher Creek) Improvement Area No. 2, Series 2023, City of Fresno, County of Fresno, State of California in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$7,000,000; authorizing the execution and delivery of a First Supplemental Indenture providing for the issuance of such bonds; approving a Bond Purchase Contract providing for the sale of such bonds; approving an Official Statement; approving a Continuing Disclosure Certificate; authorizing the sale of such bonds; and authorizing related actions and the execution of related documents in connection with the

issuance, sale and delivery of such bonds.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

- On March 25, 2010, the City adopted Resolution 2010-058, consenting to CSCDA to act as the
 issuer for the bonds associated with the Fancher Creek development. The CFD district included
 three improvement areas, but bonds were only sold to finance improvements in the Fancher Creek
 Business Park. The Bonds were sold by CSCDA in January, 2013 (the "CSCDA 2013 Bonds").
- CSCDA established the appropriation limits Improvement Areas 1, 2 and 3 on July 7, 2022 for a to-be-determined bond issuance at a later date.
- Fancher Creek is requesting the issuance of the second series of bonds for the development.

BACKGROUND:

Fancher Creek Town Center is a large-scale, transformative, mixed-use project located at the recently completed eastern terminus of Highway 180 in the City of Fresno. An integral part of the City of Fresno's general plan, the project embodies the theme of "Live, Work and Play" by providing all the living, working, shopping, and entertainment amenities desired by today's families and businesses.
